Welcome.....

Dear friends and supporters

Welcome to our 2026 newsletter. Last year was the sanctuary's and my first full year without Sue and everything is still standing! Whilst the sanctuary is a naturally busy environment with no two days the same, the aim this year has been to try and keep things calm and smooth-running as we still complete a transition period from Sue's administration.

The number of cats we've taken in has been about average with a lot of pressure put on us just before Christmas due to another rescue centre on the island becoming full and temporarily not being able to accept any. This meant that as well as us continuing to take in elderly cats and those on long-term medication, we were also forced to accept younger, healthy cats. Last year however, we began homing the younger, well cats when the right homes fitted the right situations, and I must say some wonderful homes were found. Our checks are stringent but we feel this is right as we have a responsibility not only to the cat, but to the previous owners, who have entrusted us with their cat's welfare and best interests for the future. You can read about a couple of homing successes later in this edition.

We made the decision to remain open during winter once again, but on Sundays only, and continue that until May where we would revert to our summer openings of Wednesday and Sunday 2pm-5pm. Last year, the bad weather and extensive rainfall meant we couldn't continue this, mainly due to the vast amount of mud washing down from the field making access to most areas impossible. Last Spring we had very necessary drainage works carried out and the difference once they were completed has been huge! It's meant we've all been able to get around the sanctuary with ease during the bad weather and storms and also remain open. It's important we remain open as the cats enjoy the company of different people and we require the steady stream of food donations

and gift shop sales and we're very grateful to everyone who visited us during the winter. We are now looking forward to the summer season where we will be open on Wednesdays and Sundays 2pm-5pm.

Thank you to everyone who donates towards our cause, whether it's cash donations, purchasing from the gift shop or sending us items from our Amazon wish list. However little that maybe I can assure you it all helps us. We had a tremendous amount of deliveries over Christmas which was very welcome given it's outside our main visiting season. Legacies are a vital part of our funding so please do consider leaving us a legacy in your will. We received a very generous one towards the end of 2025 and using it for the purpose it was intended, there will be a lot of work being carried out this year to update and maintain many parts of the sanctuary which have become tired.

Finally a big thanks to all who help the sanctuary continue to function. From staff and volunteers, to supporters and donors. Of course, we must always pay tribute to our very understanding and compassionate vet Dr. Ruth and all at Jane Callow vets for their continued outstanding support, with Ruth making monthly visits and using our on-site vet surgery when required.

Shadow's trial FIP treatment

Shadow has only been at the sanctuary for a short period of time and is still very young. Yet she has already been through more than most cats will go through in their entire life.

We received the request to take in Shadow when we were contacted by a relative of the owner. He explained that they were minding the cat but the arrangement was only supposed to be temporary, however, it now seemed that the owner couldn't have the cat back. The cat, called Shadow, he explained was only 6 months old and not spayed. At the time, we were the only facility on the island accepting cats so we agreed to take Shadow in. Once Shadow was with

us, Dr. Ruth was due to visit the same week and so during that visit, she spayed her in our surgery.

Shadow went into the end room of our Rowanberry complex which is where all our new cats go. During the next few weeks, despite attention from staff and volunteers, it was evident that Shadow hadn't settled into sanctuary life. It was also apparent that her health was significantly declining. After attempting all our usual initial treatments, from the



symptoms and her rapidly deteriorating health, we feared that she could have FIP which can be exposed from the stress. We arranged for her undergo tests at the vets and it did indeed confirm that Shadow had FIP. This is a fatal disease, of which we have an article about on our website, but there is currently a trial treatment available and, following consultation with Dr. Ruth, we agreed to start Shadow on the course. We felt that she was so young and had already been through a lot, but was so friendly and was still enjoying her food showing intent to live, so we felt she had to be given the chance. The immediate concern was that her kidneys were in a very poor condition and not functioning correctly so she had to be treated for that first and show signs of improvement before treatment commenced.

Shadow does indeed appear to have a very strong will to live and she pulled through the crucial period and duly began receiving FIP treatment. After several weeks Dr. Ruth was happy that Shadow could continue her treatment at the sanctuary. The initial treatment period is twelve weeks followed by a four week rest where tests are taken again to see if the condition is still active. We decided that Shadow needed a space all to herself but that a cage was not an option for that length of time. Therefore the only place Darryl could think of, was the office! So, a space was made for near the radiator, where she has her bed but she quickly decided she liked the office chairs and desk more! So far, she is responding very



well to the treatment and is undergoing it whilst this is being written, to which she is acting as an overseer of! We can't be sure what the future will hold for Shadow but so far, the signs are good. She is gaining weight and her coat is very slick and shiny which are all positive signs. The office has currently been renamed as 'The Penthouse Suite' but we really hope by the time summer comes round that Shadow will be free of FIP, healthy and outside ready to welcome visitors, we all have our fingers crossed.

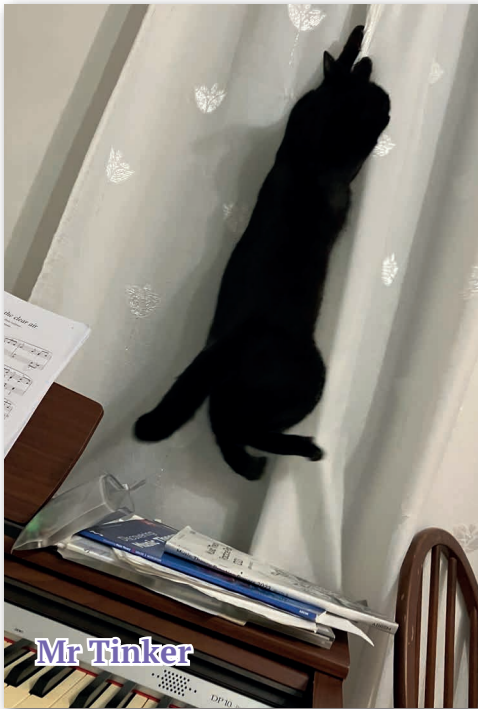

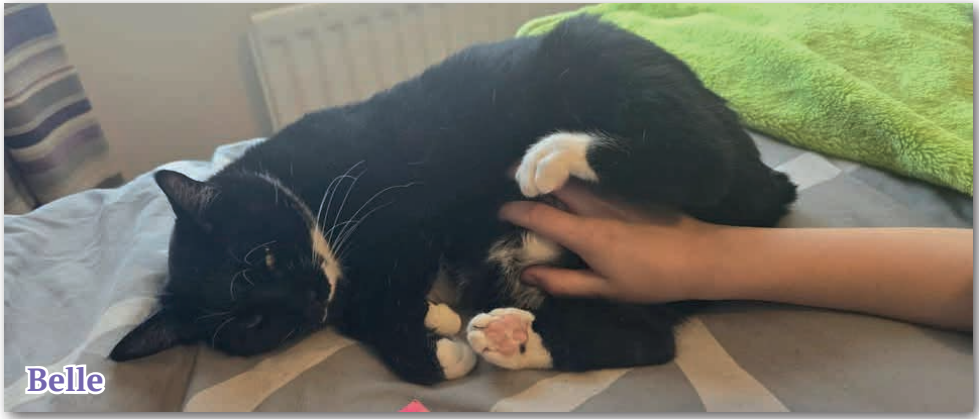

Tommy and Gerty recently came to the sanctuary for a sad but all too common story.

We received a call from a gentleman who advised us that his neighbour, who was an elderly gentleman and had been taken into hospital. He explained that the gentleman owned two cats and that he was so ill he would not survive. The owner had no family on island and his two cats were both thirteen years old. He had always expressed a wish that his cats were to come to the sanctuary in the event that they outlived him, but with nobody able to care for them, the decision had to be made for us to take them immediately.

The two cats were a male, Tommy and a female, Gerty. Both were extremely fond of the owner and had been very well cared for. Tommy was easy to put into a basket but Gerty was lost without her owner and had gone into hiding in the house. We

brought Tommy back to the sanctuary and left the neighbour a trap and in no time at all, Gerty made her way into it and she quickly came to join her brother here.

As with all new cats, they both went into our end room of the Rowanberry complex and settled in very well. Gerty was a lot more shy than Tommy, who was very confident and forward towards us all and enjoyed plenty of fuss.

Over time, Gerty began to trust us and started coming out of her hooded bed for fuss and with her being long-haired, she will also now allow us to brush her as she finds it a bit difficult to keep on top of her knots! We're looking forward to seeing them out and about during the summer enjoying the warmer weather.

A new home for Saffy from the sanctuary's largest cat rescue operation during 2025

Our supporters and indeed, any of you who read last year's newsletter, will remember our main story was covering our rescue of the year. From one property we took twenty eight cats, ranging from days old kittens to two-three years old. A good number of them were homed and some remain at the sanctuary. One of the homed cats, Saffy was snapped up by one of our staff members, Abby and this is the story of her finding her happy home...

The Mann Cat Sanctuary has held a place in my heart ever since I was a child. I used to visit with my family when we moved to the island in the early 2000's. I started my job here in April last year and it didn't take long for me to fall in love with each and every cat.

Saffy caught my eye with her beautiful markings and colouring. She was a very timid girl but I just knew I wanted to take her home. I was so happy when Darryl told me I could! After a couple of days of hiding behind the sofa, Saffy eventually came out to play and got to know my other two cats. After a couple of weeks she began to fully trust myself and my daughter Ava.



She is now a happy little lap cat who is very vocal when she knows it's nearly dinner time! She's now part of the family and we couldn't imagine life without her.

Bella is a Shetland pony and came to live at the sanctuary in the winter of 2023 at the age of fourteen. She is around 11 hands high and had been very neglected, coming to us in a very poor condition. She was very underweight, both of her eyes were infected and hadn't been treated. Her teeth were also sore and her hooves hadn't be cared for so it was very painful for her whenever she walked or moved.

To accommodate Bella, we had to move the turkeys to a new location and someone very kindly sponsored a new shed for them. This opened up a stable, which was also a small storage area so the stable was very quickly and easily made into one large space and Bella was ready to move in. We covered the floor of the stable in rubber matting to go underneath her bedding so that it would protect her sore feet. When she arrived, we wormed her, treated her eyes and mouth and the farrier saw to her feet. After a good clean she looked like a different pony!

Bella quickly got into a routine mixing with our other residents and now shares a stable with Lola. She is exceptionally cheeky, a trait in Shetlands but none of us mind that here! She can also move very well now, and can often be seen joining in with a gallop around the field with our other ponies, Lola and Lulu! Miso is an extremely friendly resident here. She is very distinctive, both in the colour and the fact that she only has three legs.

Miso's reason for coming to the sanctuary is an all too common and sad one. Her owner contacted us to explain that she was going through a marriage breakup and due to new accommodation, which she needed to move into quickly, she was unable to keep her. It was arranged that Miso would be brought to the sanctuary. Her owner explained that Miso had been involved in a car accident when she was young, which had resulted in her losing one of her back legs.

Miso settled into life at the sanctuary very well and was no trouble at all. She received plenty of attention from us to settle her and lapped up every bit of it! As with our previous three-legged cats, she has no difficulty with mobility and climbs trees and walls with ease. Miso is an avid explorer and spends as much time outside as she possibly can. In the winter, she will spend the cold nights in Rowanberry but once it's daylight she's out again, scooting round from the back fields to the front lawn!

Sid's story began when we received a call from a lady who explained that there was an un-neutered Tom cat terrorising her neighbourhood. She said that the cat was vicious and had attacked several cats on the estate, but her cat was his latest victim. He'd caused extensive vet bills for several owners and the estate had had enough of him! A trap was set for the Tom and we soon had the cat.

Back at the sanctuary, at first we put him in a cage in our utility room where he could see plenty of activity and we could assess what he was like. He was indeed, quite an angry fella and had several bad scratches and wounds. We decided to name him Sid, after Sid Vicious! Dr. Ruth was booked for a visit later in the week and neutered Sid in the surgery. Once he'd come round and had a meal, we moved him to our outdoor Catio, which adjoins the Cabin. The Catio is an enclosed outdoor area with a climbing tree and little houses and it also provides access into the Cabin via a cat flap. Sid seemed to take to living in there, we had hoped that he would venture inside the Cabin, but he is very comfortable outside and stayed in the Catio all through winter. Sid is now happy to have other cats around him, who come and go from the Cabin, and is very calm natured now. He will tolerate a little bit of fuss from us but it's very much on his terms which is fine with us! Would you like to sponsor him?



Socks

Socks is one of our best natured cats here, having arrived in the summer of 2025. Socks arrived due to his original owner of nine years, going into residential care. With no immediate family to care for Socks, the owner's neighbour had agreed to take him in, to see if he would settle there. After several months, things weren't working out, with Socks choosing to spend most of his time outside. As winter approached, we decided that Socks should move to the sanctuary.

We put Socks in the Willows building and he was so laid back and relaxed, we knew he would be fine. He quickly claimed a chair and bed as his, enjoyed his food and always made sure he received plenty of fuss from staff and volunteers! In the Willows with Socks, were some of the remaining cats from our big rescue of 'The 28' in 2025 and we'd decided that the time had come that the cat flap could open for them, to venture outdoors. This included Socks and once we were satisfied he'd been here long enough, the flap was opened and out they went! Initially Socks spent a lot of time outside, even staying out of our sight overnight which did concern us a bit, but soon enough he was back walking proudly around the decking of the Willows. He now spends his time between the Willows and the hay room where he likes to sleep on the bales. Socks is a fine old gentleman and deserves a sponsor or two!

Daisy's story – this year's cover girl...

This year's cover girl, Daisy, is one of the sanctuary's well known characters and features regularly on our social media updates. She has gained an even bigger presence to us all since the passing of Sue, as Daisy is one of the many cats whom Sue hand-reared and nurtured to health, after coming to the sanctuary as an orphaned kitten.

Daisy was first featured in our 2022 newsletter, where the story was told about her being brought to the sanctuary at only a few days old. She was found by a dog walker along with another kitten with no sign of their mother. The kittens wouldn't have survived long at all so the dog walker arrived at the sanctuary soon after the call where Sue was ready for them.

Armed with blankets, heat pads and, of course, bottles ready to feed them, Sue immediately got to work. Named Daisy and Thomas there were regular updates posted of their progress but sadly, Thomas was too weak and passed away. Daisy, however, went from strength to strength and grew into a beautiful Manx cat.





For the first few months Daisy lived in the house with Sue, but once she started to venture outside, she gradually became more independent. We made her a sponsor cat and as expected, she is a very popular one. She is very easy to spot on the webcams and loves visitors, who in turn, all fall for her!

Daisy does like a wander, taking herself off up the fields and in the summer, this can be for several days at a time but she always returns and makes a point of letting us know when she's back! She likes to sleep in the stables with the donkey, Mary who we feel is happy to have her company.

Daisy is a constant, warm reminder to us of the type of extraordinary work Sue did and a part of Sue definitely lives on in Daisy.



Fern's story – an update from 2025

In last year's edition, we featured a story on a cat called Fern who had only been with us a short while before the newsletter was written and had suffered a very traumatic time.

Fern had been living in a lady's garden and acting feral. The lady had been feeding her only for a few days and then noticed, once Fern got a little closer, that one of her eyes was in a terrible mess. She contacted us and we immediately went to set a trap for her.

We soon had her back at the sanctuary and whilst we knew what the treatment to give her should be and could start it, Fern was very bad tempered and aggressive towards us which made treating an eye injury virtually impossible. It was now Christmas Eve but things couldn't wait and we contacted Dr. Ruth and took Fern up to see her. Given the severity of the injury and her aggression, we agreed that the best thing for Fern was for her eye to be removed. The operation was indeed carried out on Christmas Eve and she recovered at the surgery over the next couple of days and then she came back down to us.

The change in Fern was instant and dramatic. She was relaxed, and not only happy for us to treat her with her antibiotics but was so affectionate and enjoyed fuss! It was apparent then just how much pain she had been in to cause that temperament. No owner was ever traced for her, despite her obviously being familiar with people but she is very much our gain. She spent a lot of time in the house after she was fully recovered and eventually decided to try going outside. Once she found the cattery, she never looked back and now loves being in the lounge and conservatory! Fern also really enjoys the open days with the visitors and it's so warming to see how happy and settled she has become. Fern can also be sponsored on our website.

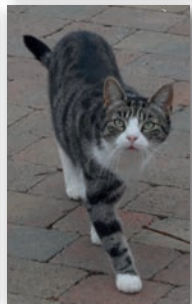

Our new 'Forget-Me-Not' memorial wall

A few years ago, we unveiled a new feature here with a 'Forget-Me-Not' memorial wall.



It was an outdoor feature, attached to our 'Cabin' building. Painted by local artist Barbara Barker, members of the public could purchase plaques to be mounted on the wall and could customise them with a personal remembrance message. These messages were either in memory of a loved person or animal. Unfortunately the wall didn't fare well with our Manx weather and as it started to fall apart, we decided to think about a new location for it.

Looking indoors, we thought the wall in the lounge, which is the sanctuary entrance and main hub for visitors, would make an ideal location. Dale and his colleagues who were here doing some ground and joinery works at the time, sourced us a new board and they fitted it to size perfectly. Barbara was brought back into action and she not only replicated the design of the original, but

also added a delightful small 'Rainbow Bridge' feature which adds a really lovely, subtle touch to those plaques which are in memory of loved pets.

We are really happy with the new location for this wall and it's made an excellent new addition to the lounge. Webcams

1. Lounge 1

There is always plenty of activity to be seen and enjoyed on the lounge webcam. The lounge, joined to the conservatory, houses the majority of the residents and on open days is the main entrance to the sanctuary.

2. Lounge 2

Our latest camera gives you an alternative, second view of the Lounge from the rear door, facing the entrance.

3. Conservatory

The conservatory adjoins the lounge and again, there is always plenty to be seen. At the far end of the room is our tree of life, where leaves are bought either online, or while visiting the sanctuary and placed on the tree. These are often done in memory of a sponsored resident, or a supporter's own cat that has passed away.

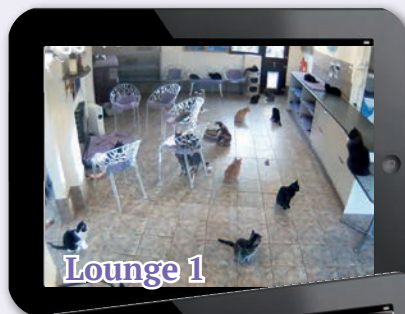
4. Rowanberry

The Rowanberry complex has replaced our twenty year old porta cabins, one of which was the feral house, and this is one of the rooms from the Rowanberry. This room is most commonly used to house our new residents. They stay in here for a short period or time whilst we settle them in, before integrating them into the main part of the complex once they're ready.

5. The Willows

The Willows was built to replace our ancient aviary. It's a spacious cabin which has a cat flap leading to unrestricted outdoor access, which we can lock when we need to keep any cats in. When we undertook our biggest rescue in 2024, taking twenty eight cats from one property, The Willows was the ideal room for them all to go into and just what we needed.

Thank you to Enid from America for all her help and also for naming the new room after her precious cat, Willow, who passed away. Thanks to the Kaiser Trust for all their help.

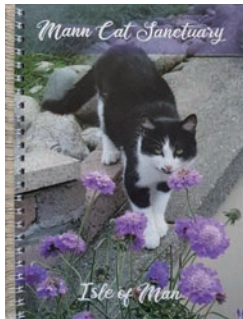

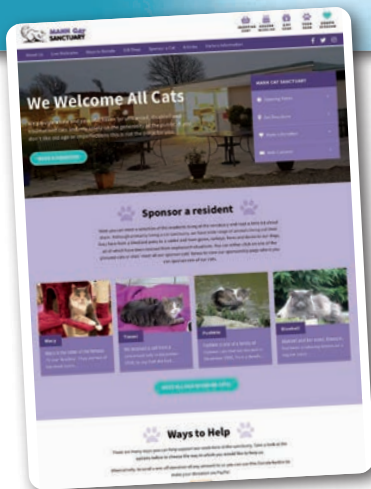
